4136	04/09/15	Silvastar Forest Products LLC - Ferndale	Whatcom	On March 13, 2015, Silvastar Forest Products LLC – Ferndale, self-reported that they exceeded their volatile organic compound (VOC) limit for the months of January and February 2015.
4139	04/09/15	Juan Sanchez	Skagit	Illegal demolition and burning of two single family residences. The burn pile was approximately 20' \times 20' \times 4' and contained prohibited material in the form of demolition debris. Failure to notify and perform asbestos surveys prior to demolition, and failure to abate asbestos.

Process upsets reported with excess emissions

04/10/15	BP West Coast Products LLC	Whatcom	Product flaring in preparation for maintenance activities resulted in excess NOx emissions. Initial estimates indicate emissions greater than 1,000 pounds NOx.
04/19/15	Phillips 66 Company	Whatcom	Emissions of SO2 from the No. 1 and No. 2 sulfur recovery units at the sulfur plant exceeded limits. Quantity of excess SO2 emissions hasn't yet been reported.
04/23/15	BP West Coast Products LLC	Whatcom	Potential exceedance of SO2 limits due to a malfunction at the sulfur plant No. 2 tail gas unit. Quantity of excess SO2 emissions hasn't yet been reported.
04/24/15	Chemtrade Solutions LLC	Skagit	Visible emissions estimated at 40% opacity observed for 20 minutes during start-up of the sulfuric acid plant.
04/27/15	Puget Sound Energy - Encogen	Whatcom	Upset resulting in excess NOx emissions from the No. 2 and No. 3 combustion turbines. Quantity of excess NOx emissions hasn't yet been reported.
