CALL TO ORDER

Board of Directors Chairman Bob Severns called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

PRESENTATION

NWCAA Compliance Manager Toby Mahar presented an overview of how NWCAA's role implementing the Clean Air Act fits with the Department of Ecology and the US EPA.

The agency was formed by, and implements rules and regulations that are promulgated under, legislative actions – the Federal and State Clean Air Acts.

Both the Federal Clean Air Act and the State Clean Air Act recognize that air pollution must be addressed at the most local level possible to solve local problems. The State Clean Air Act defaulted to create county-level air pollution control authorities. Department of Ecology was assigned to those counties that did not activate the authorities. As a result, in WA there are seven local clean air agency jurisdictions where ninety percent of Washington State's population resides.

A notable exception to local jurisdiction is where Ecology has assumed jurisdiction by rule – in our area that is why the Intalco aluminum smelter is not regulated by NWCAA (WAC 173-400-020.

NWCAA is the lead agency with respect to Title 5 and minor source permitting, compliance assessment and enforcement (including permits, federal, state, and local rules), ambient monitoring, outdoor burning, asbestos, and nuisance issues in our 3 counties (with the exception of the Intalco facility). Ecology leads the major permitting, major source emissions inventory collection, as well as additional monitoring and planning. Whereas, EPA is largely in an oversight role and retains data repositories. There are collaborative efforts as well, such as woodstove program implementation, between all three agencies.

PRESENTATION

NWCAA Executive Director Mark Buford shared an update regarding the Agency's Strategic Plan.

Buford gave a brief history of NWCAA's Strategic Plan:

- December 2013 Board of Directors adopted Strategic Plan
- May 2016 Board updated Plan
- November 2019 Working retreat with Board, Advisory Council and staff, occurred to discuss Plan.
- A small work group consisting of Advisory Council members (John Wolpers, Carl Weimer, Sandy Paris), and NWCAA staff (Mark Buford, Alicia Huschka, and Toby Mahar) has been meeting during the past six months.
- August 2020 Present Plan to Advisory council
- September 2020 Present Plan to Board
- October 2020 Board considers formal adoption of plan.

After a couple of suggested changes, the Advisory Council recommended moving the Strategic Plan forward to the Board of Directors for their approval and adoption.

Board members expressed their support for the plan moving forward, with no suggested changes. Buford will bring forward a resolution for approval of the plan at the October Board meeting.

ACTION ITEMS

Bills and claims

Board members discussed the bills and claims reports for August 2020. Donovan made a motion to approve the August (\$427,313.46) 2020 bills and claims. Janet St. Clair seconded the motion, and the Board approved the bills and claims 7-0.

STAFF REPORTS

<u>Director's report - Mark Buford</u>

Buford reported to the Board on the following matters:

 Buford explained that the Northwest will soon be impacted by an offshore large smoke plume that is flowing into our region. The offshore smoke is moving northeast from the wildfires occurring in California and Oregon. Buford intends to continue communicating via emails with Board and Advisory Council members regarding the air quality status for our area.

The Agency has instituted an Air Quality burn ban, and this will remain in place until the weather patterns change and rain arrives for our area.

New source review and air operating permit update - Agata McIntyre

NWCAA Engineering Manager Agata McIntyre reported on the August 2020 construction permit (new source review) activity.

The Agency received one application for a construction permit and issued four construction permits.

One of the permits issued during August was for the Tesoro refinery to replace the existing maintenance shop paint spray booth with a new spray booth with exhaust filters to control air emissions.

Enforcement update - Toby Mahar

NWCAA Compliance Manager Toby Mahar reported that NWCAA issued six notices of violations in August, related to facility operational issues and illegal outdoor burning.

The Agency also issued one penalty to the Phillips 66 refinery addressing an excess emissions event last winter from their Fluid Catalytic Cracking Unit.

NWCAA staff have also been working with the Skagit County Fire Marshals to address multiple outdoor burning investigations. Mahar stated that she greatly values this partnership and she is working on updating the inter-agency agreements.

There being no further business to consider, the meeting adjourned at 2:42 p.m.
